RCMAR Condemnation of Atlanta Murders and History of Anti-Asian Discrimination

On behalf of the Directors of the RCMAR Programs across the country, we endorse [the statement](#) written by our colleague, Rutgers RCMAR Director Xinqi Dong, that condemns the murder of eight people in Atlanta this week that included six Asian women. This follows a recent string of violent attacks against Asian American and Pacific Islanders and a history of anti-Asian discrimination. We continue to be saddened, angry, and frustrated at the hate crimes committed in our country, and reaffirm our pledge to hold our own academic institutions accountable for their diversity and equity efforts, and identify and work to systematically eliminate explicit and implicit bias, and structural racism, that exists in our own institutions and professions.

This award is named in honor of the late Dr. James Jackson, a renowned social psychologist who changed the way the field examined and understood Black life and mental health in the United States.

Criteria:
All nominees must:

- Be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident of the United States
- Have an established record of independent research in mental health
- Have demonstrated innovative contributions to mental health disparities research, including identifying, developing, testing, or implementing solutions to the mental health disparities and diversity challenges facing the field
- Have demonstrated a record of promoting scientific and academic excellence, including but not limited to teaching and other scholastic activities
- Have demonstrated excellence in mentorship
- Have demonstrated a commitment to community engagement
- Be available to deliver a 30-minute virtual lecture about their work in late July 2021 during Minority Mental Health Month (if selected)

Eligibility:
Exceptional researchers in mental health disparities who demonstrate excellence in:

- Individual achievements in mental health disparities research
- Research and knowledge in mental health disparity areas
- Excellence in mentorship, particularly in supporting black, indigenous, and people of color (BIPOC) trainees

This award is named in honor of the late [Dr. James Jackson](#), a renowned social psychologist who was the Daniel Katz Distinguished Professor of Psychology at the University of Michigan. Dr. Jackson's research on race, ethnicity, racism, health, and mental health has had far-reaching impacts on the fields of disparities research and minority mental health. Of particular significance, he authored the National Survey of Black Americans and the National Survey of American Life, which changed the way the field examined and understood Black life and mental health in the United States. To acknowledge Dr. Jackson's great impacts on the fields of disparities research and minority mental health, the NIMH will honor an outstanding researcher who has demonstrated exceptional individual achievement and leadership in mental health disparities research and excellence in mentorship, influence, and support of students (particularly BIPOC students).
