Health Equity Scholars for Action
Application Deadline: Wed, 16 Jun 2021

This new call for proposals seeks researchers from underrepresented communities and will provide funding, mentorship and coaching, and a community of support to help advance their careers. This new program will award 15 grants of \$250,000 over 2 years.

RWJF is looking for scholars interested in health, well-being, and equity who have completed a doctoral degree within the last 5 years, and who are researchers with a full-time academic appointment that can lead to tenure, or postdoctoral fellows poised to be in such a position by the start of the program (Dec 1, 2021). They are seeking applicants from groups that are historically underrepresented in research, such as racially minoritized groups; first-generation college graduates; people for whom English is not a native language; people from low-income communities; LGBTQ+ individuals; individuals experiencing disabilities, and others.

"Felix Kabo, a researcher at the University of Michigan Institute for Social Research, says he's disappointed with the results, but not surprised. "We know that when all entrepreneurs do well ... we all benefit as a nation, right? So it's in our best interest to make sure that our taxpayer dollars are being used to create a level playing field. And clearly, this shows that some of these programs, at best are doing nothing to level the playing field, but at worst, they're actually tilting it even further."

"Kabo and a team of researchers wrote in a [report](#) on the first round of PPP loans in late 2020. The study looked at results of a nationwide survey from the [University of Southern California](#). It found that Black business owners were about 30 times less likely to receive government aid for people or businesses affected by the pandemic."

Introduction to Qualitative Meta-Synthesis Methods: Achieving STEM Equity and Inclusion through Syntheses
Thursday, May 20th, 1:00 – 4:00pm ET

The workshop, **offered at no cost**, is the fourth in a series of webinars offered through the PEERS Data Hub that will focus on STEM

research methods. This workshop is for early- and mid-career faculty, researchers, postdoctoral scholars, and graduate students in STEM education and related disciplines to gain basic skills in qualitative meta-synthesis research. Instructors from the Institute for Meta-Synthesis at TERC will present materials they have developed to build capacity in qualitative literature meta-synthesis methods, with a special focus on STEM equity and inclusion literature. They will introduce several aspects of qualitative meta-syntheses research, including: what differentiates literature meta-syntheses from literature reviews; steps for the pre-search process; literature search and selection processes; deductive, inductive, and hybrid coding; and thematic analysis. The instructors will provide demonstrations and hands-on activities for participants, which will be drawn from the instructors' previous literature meta-synthesis projects focused on the experiences of women of color in STEM (e.g., see paper here: <https://onlinelibrary.wiley.com/doi/full/10.1002/jee.20345>). By the end of the workshop, participants will have the fundamental skills for conducting a literature search and an understanding of how raw qualitative literature can be coded as data, then transformed into the Findings and Discussion of a meta-synthesis paper.

Five Early-Career Researchers Selected for the William T. Grant Scholars Class of 2026

Riana Elyse Anderson is an Assistant Professor of Health Behavior and Health Education at the University of Michigan School of Public Health. With the Scholars award, Anderson will test a therapeutic intervention to decrease the impact of racial discrimination on Black youth's mental health. In this two-part study, Anderson will evaluate the efficacy of EMBRace (Engaging, Managing, and Bonding through Race), a clinical intervention that integrates racial socialization to reduce the effects of discrimination for Black youth, as well as assess the methods by which the program improves racial coping and subsequent psychosocial outcomes for participants.
