Health Education & Behavior (HE&B) invites full manuscripts from students as first authors for a special issue highlighting undergraduate, masters, and doctoral student perspectives and analyses on the future of health education and behavior. This call for papers encourages student perspectives that envision, challenge, and critique the future health education and behavior research. The polarities of the current socio-political environment invite attention to systems, actions, and values. On one hand the future is dim and dire, and promises more COVID-19 variants, new diseases, climate change disasters and displacement, unchecked economic inequalities, and weakened democracies around the globe. It promises continued attacks on human rights as seen by recent protests of abortion rights, government sanction police brutality, the absence of worker protections, care for people who are disabled, and voter's rights. We are also in an age where conversations and actions about decolonization with intersectionality and antiracism are being prioritized. Student perspectives offer an opportunity to shape the trajectory in response to these polarities.

HE&B is a peer-reviewed, bimonthly journal that publishes authoritative empirical research and commentary on critical health issues of interest to a broad range of professionals whose work involves understanding factors associated with health behavior and evidence-based social and behavioral strategies to improve health status.

Studying the impact of climate change on older adult health and well-being April 20, 2022

As our nation observes Earth Day this week, NIA recognizes that far too many people continue to struggle due to climate change and related weather conditions. Now more than ever, it's crucial to better understand the science of changing climates and their impact on the health and well-being of older adults. The 2020 report of The Lancet Countdown on health and climate change identified older adults as a vulnerable population experiencing excess morbidity and mortality associated with extreme weather, such as alarming heatwaves, widespread wildfires, and violent hurricanes. NIA behavioral and social research program priorities (PDF, 433K) include supporting research to investigate older adults' health outcomes and their preparedness, adaptation, and resilience to climate change and extreme weather conditions.
